Multitasking helps me as performer: Shraddha



MUMBAI, AUG 9 /-/- From promoting her upcoming film 'Street' to doing prep work for Saina Nehwal biopic, Shraddha Kapoor is multitasking at the moment and the actor says while it takes a toll on her, it also helps her as a performer. It has been a busy year for Shraddha with 'Street' and 'Batti Gul Meter Chalu' releasing back-to-back, the shooting of 'Saaho', and prep work for Saina Nehwal biopic. "Sometimes working on films simultaneously can get difficult. It takes a toll on you. But it also helps switching between characters. I feel taking a break from one character to another helps me. "But at the same time, you do not want to over-exhaust yourself thinking about one character. One day you are this person, the other day you are another, it is the perk of being an actor that we can be someone else," Shraddha told PTL.

At the beginning of her career, Shraddha was seen as a girl-next-door, but today she feels blessed to be getting diverse roles. "With 'Haseena Parkar', I had the opportunity to try something different. Also, all my characters be it in 'Street', 'Batti Gul Meter Chalu' and Saina Nehwal biopic are very different from each other. I am glad that makers are looking at me in a different way."

While she is proud of doing 'Haseena Parkar', its box office failure disappointed her. "I think a lot of people watched on TV, which is ironic because why did not you go to theatres? I don't hold both success and failure close to me. That is bound to happen. The only thing I can control is on working hard and giving my best."

The 'Ok Jaanu' star has now shifted focus on the Saina Nehwal biopic, for which she starts shooting from next month. The film will be directed by Amole Gupte. "It is a physically demanding film. But it is an inspiring story as so many people look up to her. I feel grateful to be playing that part. I will begin shooting for it next month and the prep is on. I am having a great time playing badminton. It is fabulous to be part of such a great story," Shraddha says. Asked if she has mastered the game by now, she said, "I don't know that. I am trying to. It is the second most difficult sport in the world. It is not easy." The 31-year-old is equally happy to be a part of Prabhas's next film 'Saaho', that is being shot simultaneously in Tamil, Telugu and Hindi. She will be doing her own stunts.

"It is difficult but I want to do as much as I can do it on my own. If there is a stunt for which I am not qualified enough, I will be happy to use a body double for it. "So one has to be responsible. Sometimes I tend to get over excited and over involved but the professionals know what you have to do and what not. I follow what I am told." She says an action film is quite difficult to do and comes with its own set of challenges. "Certain level of fitness always helps. I am pushing myself maximum for 'Saaho', Saina Nehwal biopic and whatever is the demand of the role." Currently, Shraddha, is busy promoting 'Street', a horror comedy with Rajkummar Rao. (PTI)

A decade after death, Solzhenitsyn draws a blank with young Russians

MOSCOW, AUG 9 /-/- A decade after the hugely influential author's death, some young Russians admit to only a passing knowledge of Russian dissident writer Alexander Solzhenitsyn, who won a Nobel Prize for chronicling the horrors of the Soviet Gulag. "Solzhenitsyn was a dissident, someone who opposed the Soviet regime and he was a great writer," summed up Alexander Polyakovskiy, 23, who is studying international relations. He admits he has not read any of the author's books. "They talked about him a bit when I was at high school, during the Russian literature lessons, but I don't remember too much," he added. Rather than hearing about Solzhenitsyn from teachers, "it was my mother who explained to me that he was one of the greatest writers of the 20th century," Polyakovskiy said. By

contrast, his mother Yelena emotionally described how she discovered one of Solzhenitsyn's works hidden among the family's books during the Soviet era. "I was a teenager and my parents drilled it into me that I mustn't tell anyone we had the book at home. It was a forbidden fruit," she said. "It was such a different era that it's hard for my son to imagine it," she added, explaining his lack of interest. Solzhenitsyn, who died on August 3, 2008 at the age of 89, shot to fame in the USSR with his 1962 novella that was the first in Soviet literature to describe everyday life in a prison camp, "One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich." It was based on his own experiences of seven years of imprisonment for criticising Stalin. Solzhenitsyn's most widely read book, "The Gulag Archipelago," a lengthy

chronicle of the workings of Soviet terror, sold millions of copies after being smuggled out and published in Paris in 1973. Solzhenitsyn was expelled by the Soviet authorities soon after and spent 20 years in exile in the United States before returning in triumph to Russia in 1994. Alexander Altunyan, who teaches journalism at Moscow's International University, also notes the younger generation has little interest in Solzhenitsyn's weighty historic tomes and grimly realist novels such as "Cancer Ward." "Out of a class of 30 students, no more than two or three will have read a book by Solzhenitsyn. Most of them don't know a thing about him," School teachers say they have to choose which books on the curriculum to focus on in literature lessons and some get the bare minimum of class time. Yet some do focus

on Solzhenitsyn, saying his moral and political views are still relevant. "We really do need to read Solzhenitsyn today as there are more and more attempts to deny Stalin-era repressions, when some people say nothing terrible happened in that era," said Olga Mayevskaya, a teacher of Russian language and literature. She said she spends several lessons on books by Solzhenitsyn including "One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich" and "Gulag Archipelago." "I quote the most powerful passages of Gulag Archipelago to the students," she said. "What's unbelievable is that they are not told about this in history lessons. This is the history of our country. They have to know it so it does not happen again." Russia in recent years has seen a strong tendency to present Stalin in a positive

light, while officials downplay the repressions and forced collectivisation that killed millions. Nevertheless, Solzhenitsyn remains a touchstone to many Russians. A poll last year by state pollster VTsIOM on Russians' "idols" from the 20th century put Solzhenitsyn fifth, behind such figures as cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin and World War II commander Georgy Zhukov. President Vladimir Putin, who has quoted Solzhenitsyn in speeches, has ordered official celebrations for the centenary of the writer's birth in December. A statue of Solzhenitsyn is due to be put up on a Moscow street that he named. Putin has named Solzhenitsyn a state prize a year before his death. Increasingly nationalist and conservative in later years, Solzhenitsyn backed Putin's course. (AFP)

even after 'Parmanu'. I don't hold any grudges. I have a beautiful relationship with the industry. "I was the captain in my school at the forefront of doing things. I always had an identity of myself. This very strong sense of self has put me in a situation today where I never wanted to be a part of any entourage or any camp. I have survived that way," John told PTL. It is being said that for outsiders it is important to network in the industry to get good work. But John says going to parties or manufacturing a relationship was never his style. "In Bollywood, if you try too hard to make a relationship work, it won't happen. I don't try. My relationships with people are organic. I don't try too hard to be someone's friend." His choice of films as a producer from "Vicky Donor" to "Madras Cafe" to "Parmanu" has been lauded by audiences and John, 45, feels happy about this positive change in viewers who can "sniff out" a good movie. "Honest content-

driven films are surviving. Audience can sniff out a good and a bad film. You can manipulate the audience to get a massive opening. I am one of those few people who does not believe in the opening of the film," he says. "I believe in the Monday of the film. Your film is only good if it will last two or three weeks. That's what we as actor-producers, directors shy away from because we are scared to accept failures." His next, "Satyameva Jayate" is today's representation of the angry young man thing that happened when Amitabh Bachchan first came out. It resonates with what happens in society today. "There is a lot of anger which exists in the society. The world is being polarised. There are fringe elements, extremism but the father of it all is corruption. We are talking about that," he says.
