

Dalai Lama visit, refugee, border issues kept Arunachal in news in 2017

ITANAGAR, JAN 5 (PTI) Tibetan spiritual leader the Dalai Lama's visit and China's protest, the Chakma-Hajong refugee issue, boundary dispute with neighbouring Assam and IAF chopper crash were some issues that kept Arunachal Pradesh in news during 2017. Amidst strong protest from China, the Dalai Lama on April 4 visited the state and delivered sermons and engaged in religious discourse during his seven-day stay in the state. A few days later, the Arunachal Pradesh government strongly denounced China's move to 'standardise' official names for six places in the state, which Beijing claims to be part of its territory, in an apparent retaliation to the Dalai Lama's visit. Old resentments ran high in September after the decision of the Centre to grant citizenship to Chakma and Hajongs in the state following a Supreme Court directive in 2015.

Politicians and activists, cutting across political allegiances in the state, claimed the move undermines the rights and interests of Arunachal's indigenous tribes. The All Arunachal Students' Union (AAPSU), which has a long history of anti-Chakma agitations, called a state-wide strike on September 19 to protest against the Centre's decision. It led to sporadic violence, with vehicles being set afire, and the state nearly coming to a halt, as government offices, schools and markets remained closed. In a letter to Union home minister Rajnath Singh, Chief Minister Pema Khandu said the matter was of deep emotional concern and his state was not ready to accept any infringement of the constitutional protection given to the tribes of the state. The Arunachal Pradesh Assembly also resolved to call upon the Centre to take urgent steps to protect the territorial and other consequential rights of the state tribal population as protected and guaranteed under the Constitution.

The predominantly Buddhist Chakmas and the Hindu Hajongs are among the earliest persecuted groups to have sought refuge in India. Tragedy also struck the state as it reported two helicopter crashes during 2017. An IAF chopper pressed on flood rescue mission went missing near Sagalee in Papum Pare district with three crew members and 18 BPN personnel on board on July 4. Police recovered the bodies after three days of intense search operations. In the other incident on October 6, an Indian Air Force (IAF) Mi-17 V5 helicopter crashed near Tawang killing all seven on board. In addition, an IAF chopper with Union minister Kiren Rijju on board made an emergency landing at a college ground here on July 4 due to poor visibility. The year also

witnessed crisis in the Arunachal Pradesh Public Service Commission (APSSC) following a question paper leak in the preliminary examination of combined exams. Trouble began when four Chakma candidates' names were figured in list of candidates for the preliminary examination. However, after strong protest by various students' bodies in the state their names were omitted. After the preliminary examination, aspirants accused the commission of providing erroneous question papers and setting questions from a Pakistan-based website.

The candidates even staged a dharna in front of the commission's office in the preliminary examination. The commission decided to re-conduct the preliminary examination.

Another issue that hogged the limelight in the state during 2017 was the inter-state boundary dispute with Assam. Assam forest officials on December 8 demolished four under construction tourist resorts at Dullungmukh in Lower Subansiri district, a move which evoked strong resentments among various students' bodies of the state. After a news portal made public the contents of a 60-page booklet allegedly written by former chief minister Kalikhola Pul before committing suicide on August 9, 2016, his eldest wife Dongwimsai Pul demanded the Centre to initiate a CBI inquiry into the death of her husband. The inter-state boundary dispute in the state during the year remained grim with underground cadres laying an ambush on 13 Assam Rifles near Jairampur in Changlang district on January 22 which led to death of two security personnel. Intensifying its operation against underground groups active in Tirap, Changlang and Longleng districts of the state, security forces during the year apprehended 14 NSCN (IM) rebels, 12 NSCN (K), one NSCN (U), 7 NSCN (R) and three ULFA cadres during the year besides recovering a huge cache of arms and ammunition.

To tackle the insurgency problem in three eastern districts of the state, the Centre sanctioned a special package for strengthening the security apparatus. Flood and landslides lashed several districts in the state during the year claiming several lives. The state also witnessed political crisis during the year with the ruling BJP on August 11, parting ways with its North East Democratic Alliance (NEDA) partner - the Peoples' Party of Arunachal (PPA). On August 7, the state unit of the NCFP was dissolved after resigning all its leaders from the party who later joined the National Peoples Party (NPP). The BJP formally welcomed Chief Minister Khandu into the 'parivar' on January 7. (PTI)

Bangla minister hopes for early repatriation of Rohingya

KOLKATA, JAN 5 /- Bangladeshi Information Minister Hasanul Haq Inu has expressed hope that the repatriation of Rohingya refugees from his country will start "very soon". Myanmar had in November last year agreed to take back tens of thousands of Rohingyas who fled to Bangladesh following a military crackdown. "There is an agreement between the Myanmar and Bangladesh governments. We hope the repatriation will start very soon. Although there is no time frame but those who have recently crossed over to Bangladesh, they have been scrutinised and Myanmar has agreed to take them back," Inu told reporters here last night. He lauded Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's leadership for the way it tackled the Rohingya crisis. Any refugee crisis is a stress on the economy but the Bangladesh government has passed the test, he said. Over 6,00,000 Rohingyas Muslims have fled Myanmar's violence-hit Rakhine state to neighbouring Bangladesh since August 2017 when the military intensified crackdown on their alleged militant outfits. Asked about the updation of the National Register of Citizens (NRC) in Assam, Inu said there had been no incident of violence in bordering districts of Bangladesh which might have forced migration to India in the last 40 years. "There has been no major incident of violence in the last 40 years that might have forced migration from bordering districts of Bangladesh to Assam or Tripura. Also, there are no family connections (relatives) in those areas," Inu said. The NRC of 1951 is being updated in Assam under the supervision of the Supreme Court to identify original residents of the state in order to check illegal migration. On the issue of terrorism, Inu said Bangladesh had adopted a zero-tolerance policy towards terrorism and Dhaka would not allow its soil to be used for terror acts against any country. (PTI)

Modi walks up to Manmohan in RS, shakes hands

NEW DELHI, JAN 5 /- Prime Minister Narendra Modi today walked up to former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh soon after the Rajya Sabha was adjourned sine die. The cordial "handshake" came barely weeks after the duo had been locked in a bitter war of words over Gujarat elections. As soon as Chairman Manmohan Singh adjourned the House sine die and 'Vande Mataram' was rendered, Modi was seen moving towards the opposition benches shaking hands with some members, including his predecessor. He reached the seat of the former premier, shook hands with him for quite some time and spoke to him. Among others with whom the Prime Minister was seen shaking hands were Deputy Chairman P J Kurien and veteran Congress leader Karan Singh, who was bid farewell by the Upper House today as his tenure ends on January 27.

The show of cordiality between the incumbent and the former premier follows a rare row that broke out last month after Modi insinuated that

What top editors, CEOs of publishing houses read in 2017!

NEW DELHI, JAN 5 /- When you ask CEOs, top editors and publishers whether they found time to read books published by their competitors in the year gone by, don't always expect a negative answer. For many of them managed to read a lot of books brought out by other publishers despite having a busy time in 2017. According to HarperCollins India CEO Ananth Padmanabhan, the three books he enjoyed the most were "Tom Hanks' collection of short stories 'Uncommon Type' (Penguin Random House), Tim Harford's "Fifty Things That Made the Modern Economy" (Hachette) and Dan Brown's "Origin" (Penguin Random House). He also read Walter Isaacson's biography of Leonardo Da Vinci published by Simon & Schuster which he found "purely fascinating". The top three reads of Meru Gokhale, Editor-in-Chief, Literary Publishing, at Penguin Random House India, were "Ants Among Elephants" by Sujatha Gidla (HarperCollins India), "Home Fire" by Kamila Shamsie (Bloomsbury India), and "Remnants of a Separation" (HarperCollins) by Anchal Malhotra. When asked about his favourites, Bhaskar Roy, CEO of Palimpsest Publishers, said the book that cast a spell on him was George Saunders' "Lincoln in the Bardo" (Bloomsbury). "The master short story writer poignantly explores a state between death and rebirth. Soon after the end of the American Civil War, when President Lincoln is still grappling with the unsettled situation, he sees his 11-year-old son traipsing into the surreal state between life and death. In this first novel Saunders explores an area where fiction merges into philosophy," he informed. "At the opposite end is Haruki Murakami's irresistibly irreverent 'Men Without Women' (Random House) which brilliantly explores human relationships and inner crevices of doubts, dilemmas, follies and foibles that sum up an urban man's life. This collection of short stories points to our vulnerabilities without leaving the reader sad or depressed," he said.

"My nonfiction reads were overwhelmingly topped by Rana Dasgupta's 'Notes on a Suicide', an incisive quest into the dysfunctionality and delirium of the 21st-century urban life in Europe.
