Body of migrant labourer brought from flood-hit Kerala

COCH BEHAR, AUG 22/-/ The body of Siraj Alam, a graduate migrant labourer who died in flood-hit Kerala was brought to his hometown of Kishoreganj village of Mehkiganj police station a little before the religious prayer on occasion of Eid-ul-Adha offered by the villagers.

A pall of gloom descended on the locality as the body arrives at the village. Alam, a popular youth died a couple of days before the religious festival. It has been learnt from family members of the deceased migrant labourer that he decided to try his luck as a migrant labourer in Kerala after he failed to find a suitable job despite being a graduate.

"He was working in Kerala for the last two years. Recently he fell seriously ill when a devastating flood hit the state. He had to battle for life helplessly alone as there was no one to provide him with treatment, medicine and diet he required. Eventually, he died," a brother of Alam said.

The first year college girl in her complaint said that she had posted in the social media after a spat with her mother during the day that she wished to take her own life. She soon received a Whatsapp message over her mobile phone from an unknown number allegedly inviting her to take the Momo Game challenge. When she sought to know the sender's identity, the person revealed it verbally, she claimed. Scared over the situation, the girl claimed she had informed her elder brother, who warned her against participating in the game. She then informed the police. An investigation has been launched, the police said.

KOLKATA, AUG 22/-/ On the morning of August 5 young Akhansa Bhaskar, sub-divisional officer of Raghunathpur in Purulia district went out of her office to take stock of the situation at different health centres of her sub-division. And at her very first port of call at Santuri block health centre she found to her utter chagrin that no doctor had arrived while there was a slithering queue of villagers awaiting her.

Bhaskar, doffed her identity as the SDO and donned her other identity as a registered medical practitioner and sat to attend the patients, most of whom came from the lowest strata of the society. And she had made it a week-end routine as the following week she visited Para Block health centre and attended patients. Even when it was preparing for the civil services examinations I decided that I would not let my training as a doctor go waste even if I became an administrator. And while I was taking the training for IAS at Mussouri I went around the villages near the academy and attended patients. Bhaskar, who cleared MBBS from RG Kar Medical College and

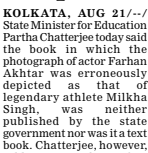
Hospital in 2014 and passed IAS the following year, told the Echo of India. The official said after she was posted at Raghunathpur the idea struck her again. "Last Saturday in the morning since I had not much work I decided to go out and visit the health centres, to see the infrastructure, the environment etc. And at Santuri when I saw the doctor had not arrived, I sat

to attend the patients. As administrator while my duty is to see that the condition at hospitals and health centres is improved. I don't feel helpless when a doctor is absent because I myself had that training. In fact I want to see poor patients on a regular basis but it is not possible because as an administrator it is not possible to do that. But I have decided that I will spend at least the weekends attending to the poor patients from villages." The forestry lady said. Partha says book depicting actor as Milkha Singh not published by govt

KOLKATA, AUG 21/-/ State Minister for Education Partha Chatterjee today said the book in which the photograph of actor Farhan Akhtar was erroneously depicted as that of legendary athlete Milkha Singh, was neither published by the state government nor was it a text book. Chatterjee, however, told reporters here after a meeting with department officials and the publisher, that if someone formally took up the matter with the publisher, the government would certainly initiate necessary action.

"It was not a text book published by the state government, and there can be such mistakes in a few books even though that is not the intention of the government will not intervene on its own but initiate action if someone complains to the minister said. An Education Department official said a high-level meeting attended by Chatterjee and other senior officials, today deliberated on the issue and the publisher of the book has already been cautioned. Meanwhile, the publisher, Anup Das, admitted it was a "serious mistake" and assured of rectifying the error. The photograph of a schoolbook depicting Akhtar as Singh had gone

viral on social media, following which the actor urged the West Bengal government to correct the "glaring error". The 44-year-old, who essayed the role of Singh in the 2013 biopic 'Bhaag Milkha Bhaag', took to Twitter to point out that a still from the film had been incorrectly used in the book instead of the real athlete's photo.

Mikha Singh, also known as 'The Flying Sikh', was the first Indian to win individual athletics gold medal at the Commonwealth Games in 1958.

Rape victim minor girl meets SP seeking immediate arrest of accused

MALDA, AUG 22/-/ Family members of a minor girl from Ronthol village under Harishchandrapur police station knocked the door of superintendent of police today urging him to arrest a local youth who allegedly raped the minor repeatedly for three days. According to her mother, the minor girl had an affair with Kayesh Ali, a local youth with whom she had physical intimacy too. "After knowing about the affair we went to Ali's house with my mother and we were summarily turned down. We lodged a police complaint against Ali that led to his arrest," she said. However, after he was released on bail, Ali allegedly started threatening the minor girl's family with dire consequences if the complaint against him had not been withdrawn.

"We refused to withdraw the police complaint. Ired by our determination Ali kidnapped my daughter on August 13 and raped her repeatedly. Finally she was dumped near our house. We went to police again but our second complaint was not received," the alleged rape-victim's mother said. Avijit Mishra, lawyer of the minor girl said that her family was compelled to seek intervention of the SP as the local police did not take action against the culprit. If the accused is not arrested immediately, we would move to court, Mishra said. Arbab Ghosh, SP, Malda has assured to look into the issue.

Muslims living in WB since childhood need not worry about NRC: Roopa Ganguly

KOLKATA, AUG 22/-/ Muslims living in West Bengal since childhood don't need to worry about the NRC, BJP MP Roopa Ganguly today said. She said a section of political parties need to politicise every issue "for the sake of national interest". Ganguly's statement comes against the backdrop of a war of words between the TMC and the BJP over the National Register of Citizens (NRC) in Assam.

"Pakistan was formed after the Partition on the basis that it becomes a Muslim country. Bangladesh (then East Pakistan) was also formed on the basis that Bengal was made part of India as it was for Hindus, who had come from (the then) East Pakistan because they were driven out from there," Ganguly said on the sidelines of a programme here.

"For those who are living in India since their childhood, including Muslims, do not need to worry about the NRC," she said.

"The Muslims who are living in Bengal since their childhood (for many decades) need not worry about the NRC. There are certain things which should not be politicised for the sake of national interest," Ganguly said. The TMC has accused the BJP of being "anti-Bengali" and said it tried to divide the people on religious lines. The BJP in its turn had accused the TMC government of turning the state into a safe haven for Bangladeshi infiltrators for the sake of vote bank politics.

Stalemate continues in Bengali serial industry

KOLKATA, AUG 21/-/ The stand-off between artistes and producers of Bengali TV serials remained unresolved for the fifth day today, with no shooting taking place in any of the eight studios of the city.

The producers' association said it was ready for talks with no pre-condition, while the artistes body maintained that dialogue would start only after getting a formal letter from the other side.

Following a call by the Artists' Forum demanding regularisation of their payment, the actors were on a ceasefire from August 18.

A spokesman of the Welfare Association of Television Producers (WATP) said the producers were ready for talks with the Forum but there should not be any pre-condition. Forum General

Secretary Arindam Ganguly maintained that talks with the WATP can take place only after getting a formal letter from the producers, not inviting it for dialogue.

Ganguly said the Forum wanted that all artistes should get their dues as decided in a meeting between the Federation of Cine Technicians and Workers of East India and the producers on July 7 and they should not be forced to work for more than 14 hours.

The WATP spokesman said the 14-hour stipulation may not be feasible during outdoor shoots, as it takes time to make all arrangements before a shoot. But still they were ready for talks on every issue without any pre-conditions with the Forum which had "unilaterally called the ceasefire from August 18", he said. Ganguly,

but many did not and the Forum took up the agitation in the interest of every artiste.

The WATP said the producers had made an arrangement for payment of artistes by August 15 but it could not succeed because of the disruption of the shooting schedule, the channels were forced to go for repeat telecast of the episodes aired earlier. In another development, the Eastern India Motion Pictures' Association (EIMPA) held an emergency meeting where 100 of its members demanded that the resolutions of an earlier meeting on raising payment of technicians of film shoots be formalised before August 31.

An EIMPA spokesman said discussions were on with the technicians' body about the demand.

Rigorous ban on plastic at forests and sanctuaries proposed by state government

JALPAIGURI, AUG 22/-/ Hefty fine has been proposed for use of plastic bags and other plastic products carried at forests and other nature parks under the state forest department. The decision was adopted with an eye to keep the forests free from pollution, said Biny Krishna Burman, minister of the department today. The prohibitory order would be implemented at Gorumara, Jaldapara, Singalla, Sinchal, Neora Valley, Mahananda sanctuary, Buxa Tiger reserve and other forests and parks under the state forest department.

Sundarban has already been declared as biosphere reserve. Use of plastic bags and other articles made of plastic has been banned in Sundarban. We want implementation of similar proscription at other forests, parks, sanctuaries and reserves also. However, not only the tourists but also the officials and employees of the department would have to abide by the new order," Burman said. The minister conceded that high use of plastic bags by tourists was a serious concern. "But the more alarming fact is that the forest employees, officials and other plastic
